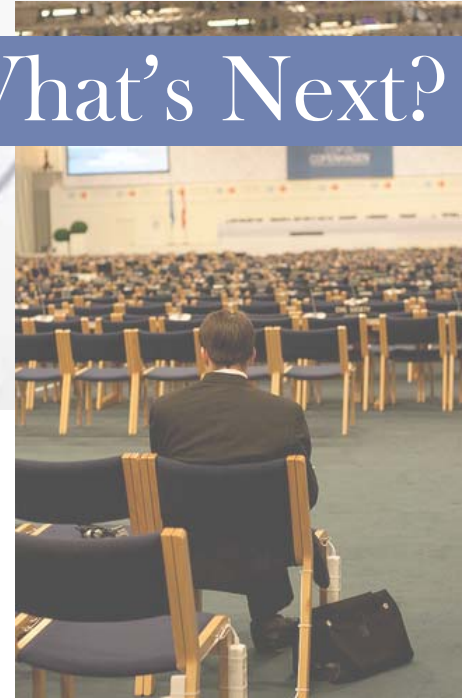


# After Copenhagen: What's Next?

COP 15, the recent United Nations climate summit in Copenhagen, was the largest environmental convention in history. The aim was to create a successor treaty to the expiring Kyoto Protocol, but the nonbinding "Copenhagen Accord" that ultimately was created fell short of these hopes. In addition to some 5,000 delegates and members of the press, 45,000 observers from non-governmental organizations were registered for the summit, and tens of thousands more took to the streets of Copenhagen to express support for a strong climate deal.



Amid the convention's tsunami of civil society actions and the media saturation was World Wide Views on Global Warming, the first-ever citizen deliberation on a global policy issue. Just over two months before COP 15, ASU and over 40 other locations around the globe each gathered 100 broadly representative citizens to discuss the issues on the Copenhagen agenda, and the results were delivered to COP 15 delegates and others. Although the results were unique and had policy relevance, it is safe to say that World Wide Views had little actual impact on the Copenhagen deliberations.
